What are the TWO most important priorities if there is an event?

- Life safety
 - Keep children and staff members from getting injured
 - First Aid for the injured
- Keep the incident from getting worse
 - Get the children to a safe area
 - Lock Down
 - Get out
 - Call 911 as soon as possible
 - You have a legal right to defend yourself



What do we know about school shootings?

- Schools are still safe places to learn and work
- There is no profile of a school shooter
- The Secret Service Safe School Initiative is still relevant
- Bullying is not the direct cause of an Active Shooter Event
- We can prevent some of these events
- Just because something bad could happen at your school does not mean it has to happen at your school!

Gunman in Ohio nursing home shooting had violent record

KIRKERSVILLE, Ohio -- Court records show the man authorities say gunned down an Ohio village police chief and two nursing home employees had a history of violence, including against the nurse who was among the slain.

The suspect, Thomas Hartless, 43, was found dead inside Pine Kirk Care Center.

Nurse Marlina Medrano, 46, nurse's aide Cindy Krantz, 48, and Kirkersville Police Chief Steven Eric Disario, 36, were killed in the Friday attack.

State and local authorities said Saturday the investigation was continuing and they had no new information to release on the deaths in the village of some 500 residents, roughly 25 miles east of Columbus.

Records show Medrano had obtained civil protection orders against Hartless. He was released from jail in April after his latest domestic violence case in March. He also served time for a 2009 abduction of another woman.

"I am afraid to be alone with him, that he will hurt me for good," Medrano wrote in her latest petition in May. The Columbus Dispatch reported that court officials said Friday that protection order was still in effect. Records show Medrano had reported injuries including a concussion and cuts requiring stitches.

The Dispatch reported that she had earlier told police he once showed her a hole he had dug and

said he would put her in it if she didn't stay with him. She also told police Hartless "doesn't like police."

What is an active shooter?

The agreed-upon definition of an "active" shooter" by US government agencies (including the White House, US Department of Justice, FBI, US Department of Education, US Department of Homeland Security, and Federal Emergency Management Agency) is "an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area." In most cases, active shooters use firearms and there is no pattern or method to their selection of victims.





Anatomy of Active Threat Events

- Active threat events can use a variety of weapons:
 - Firearms
 - Bombs
 - Knives
 - Vehicles
 - Fire as a Weapon



Anatomy of Active Threat Events

- Active threat events are dynamic and not bound by rational thought:
 - Columbine High School
 - Original plan called for bombing the school, then shooting from outside as individuals evacuated the school
 - Virginia Tech
 - Deadliest shooting carried out using solely pistols in US history
 - San Bernardino
 - Plans began to be put in place six years before
 - Original plans called to attack an interstate highway



On average:

Time is takes for police to arrive on scene to an active threat event.





On average:

Time for the perpetrator of an active threat event to be neutralized.

Minutes



On average:

Percentage of active threat events that end BEFORE police can arrive on scene.





On average: Number of killed and injured during an active threat event. Killed

4 Injured



Understanding the Value of Time

- Organizations cannot assume that the police will be on scene immediately.
 - Virginia Tech: Police arrive on scene in two minutes, takes five minutes to get to perpetrator.
- Action plans must be developed and personnel empowered and trained to act to save lives.
- Preparedness activities must go beyond the tactical response.



The Immediate Response

- Tactical Response for the True First Responders:
 - Lock Out, Get Out, Take Out
 - Organization's Emergency Preparedness
 - Important to remember the deterioration of fine motor skills!

The Immediate Response


- Tactical Response for Professional First Responders:
 - How is 911 Dispatchers working the calls?
 - Neutralization of Perpetrator
 - Law Enforcement Arriving
 - Rapid Deployment
 - **Establishment of Incident Command**
 - Deployment of Rescue Task Forces (RTFs)
 - Interoperable Communications










Levels of Response





Let's talk fire drills for a second


- Priority should move from rapid evacuation to safe evacuations
- Teachers should check the hallway for threats before leaving the classroom
- Look and listen
- Teachers should be the first one out the door, not the last
- Exterior door should be held in case students and staff must re-enter the building quickly






Violent Intruder






Violent Intruder
