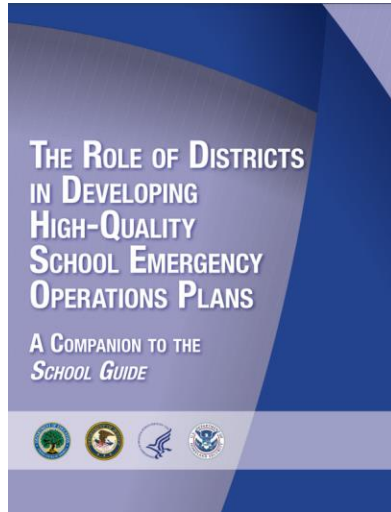
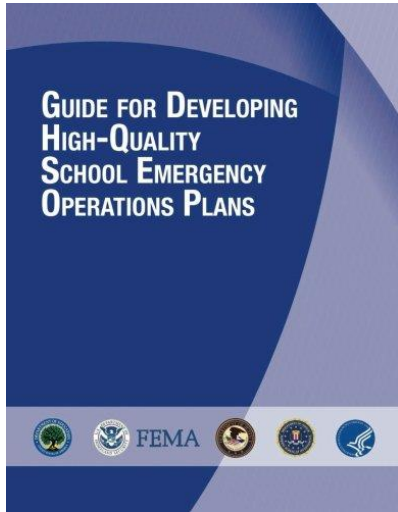

I know we are going to review EOP's, but could we talk a little about getting the process started for creating an emergency planning team? Prior to compiling a draft of the EOP do we have internal planning meetings before inviting the external parties to join the planning process?

- Most states, including Pennsylvania, have laws (ACT 44 2018) and templates for EOPs.
- REMS TA EOP Assist is a FREE tool that resides on a school/district's server and helps both write and evaluate EOPs.
- Stakeholder meetings are important BUT don't waste time and energy on any plans that do not meet the state requirements.

National best practices call for the deployment of Rescue Task Forces under unified command within **15 minutes** of an active threat beginning.

According to an FBI report, the average time it takes for law enforcement to arrive at the scene of an active threat is **three minutes**.

# Concern: Mass Casualty Event

## Before the event

- Planning
  - Emergency Operation Plans
  - ICS Training
  - CERT Training for students
  - Training staff and students
  - Exercises and After-Action Reviews

# Concern: Mass Casualty Event

## During the event

- Response
  - School/District/University EOC
  - Mass Notification
  - Incident Command System
  - Joint Information Center
  - Record Keeping (IS 201)



# Concern: Mass Casualty Event

## After the event

- Recovery
  - Joint Information Center
  - Mass Notification
  - Incident Command System
  - Counseling for students, staff, and parents
  - After-Action Review
  - Beware of free services

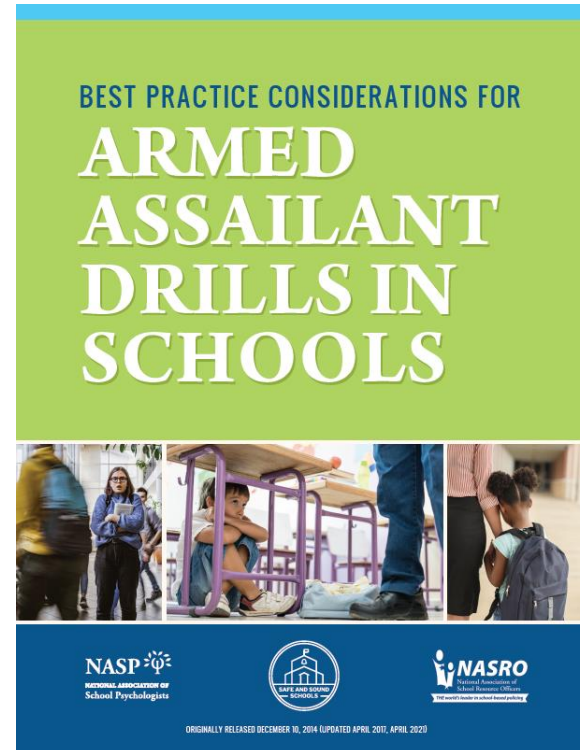

# Drills for staff and students



## **DRILLS AND TRAINING SHOULD NEVER BE SCARY!** (Yes, I am shouting!)

- We cannot prepare for every event
  - Life safety
  - Incident stabilization
- Empower not frighten
- The use of firearms (including Nerf guns!!!)
- Age-appropriate drills and discussions
- Parental involvement
- Prepare for the more likely events



**What is the difference between a THIRA  
and an SVA?**



## THIRA

- The THIRA is a three-step risk assessment process that helps communities understand their risks and what they need to do to address those risks by answering the following questions:
  - What threats and hazards can affect our community?
  - If they occurred, what impacts would those threats and hazards have on our community?
  - Based on those impacts, what capabilities should our community have?

## SVA

- The Security and Vulnerability Assessment (SVA) looks solely at our campus/school
  - Policies, procedures, cyber security, cameras, etc.
  - Can be used to highlight best practices and deficiencies and set budget priorities.
  - The THIRA for your campus/school can be part of an SVA.
  - The hazards from the THIRA must be addressed in your EOP.
